If any additional information comes to your attention which in your opinion indicates a violation of the Federal statutes within our jurisdiction, I do hope you will feel free to communicate with me.

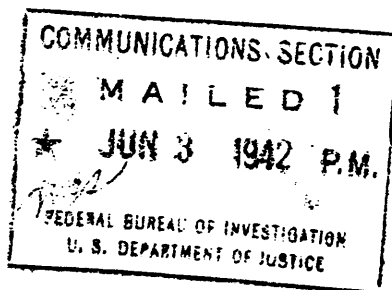

I am [redacted] of [redacted] East 35 St, N.Y.C. at the present time driving a taxi cab for the Crystle Cab Co. of East 95 St. N.Y.C. My hack license number is ^{b6} [redacted]. The reason I am giving you this information is I felt being a girl yourself you would take more of an interest in this matter than some of our bum cops. I felt you could get to the district attorney or who ever you might know could look into this matter.

Saturday night April 25/42 a boy call me as I was coming up 7 Ave. at 23 St. and jump on the side of my cab said a man in the next street wanted a cab. I drove around there and on the side walk was 4 men and one very fine looking girl in pants also 6 paper boxes. They ask me what I wanted to take them to Edgewater, N.J. I said what ever is on the clock. I said this company don't do flat work jobs so they ask me what I thought it would coast I said about \$2.50. It was \$2.40 on the clock when we got to the place which is about 3/4 mile south of 125 street ferry on the road running along the river front. There is a wire gate there, also a watch man. One of the men jump out of the cab and spoke to the gate man but he came back and told the other men we will have to get a pass but John can take the packages in to the boat and the other 3 men went into the office while they were in there.

I turn around in my seat and had a good look at the girl. She was very refined and good looking, about 20 years of age, very pale. I ask was she sick and she said no just afraid. Of what I ask or going on this trip or I said are you going to Argentina. She said yes. I was surprised. I thought she was just riding over to the boat to see a friend off. From what I heard them saying while driving them over, they ask about what kind of dancing she likes and also if she like to play the game of hide and go seek. Well I know how we played it in my kid days and I was wondering how these rats played it, and then grown up men. I ask what kind of a game is that? She said they play it on the boat. ⁶²⁻⁶⁷⁸⁹⁸⁻¹ The girls all hide and the men

1 them. The girl the man finds keep her for 3 nights. They play this game once every day on the trip. I said gosh there is a lot of men on one of those boats. Do they have enough girls for all the men? She said I don't know but they will tell me. I will have lots of girls with men and will make lots of money on the trip. I said girl I have a daughter, thank God she is married and well off. ~~Thank~~ Please take a tip from a father. I have heard of girls taking trips like that on boats during peace time but there is a war on now and your boat might be sunk and if it is you girls will surely sink with the boat because they would be locked up and sent to prison for a long time, if they were caught taking you girls on a trip like this. I said they won't get a pass so you will get a chance to think over about the boat sinking. She said I never thought of that. I we go back to New York with you I will tell them I am very hungry and I will tell you what restaurant to go to.

While we were waiting for the men to come out of the office a policeman got out of his car and ask what we wanted. I told him the men went in to get a pass so we could drive down the dock to the boat. I ask her who the men were and she said 2 of them work in the office of the steamship company and the other 2 work on the boat. The fat and oldest man seem to be the boss. When 3 men came out of the office to the cab they were met by 2 other fine looking young fellows. Very well dressed and good looking. They were introduced to the girl in the cab. The boss told one of them to take the bus down to the village and maybe you will find something. He told the other fellow to go on around 125-Lexington Avenue so they went. The Boss and one man got into the cab and we started back to N.Y. So she told them she was starved and the boss said alright we will stop at a chinese restaurant. She said I don't feel like eating this food now I would like to have a good steak and there is a place over on 35th - Lexington Avenue. Driver she said, do you know that German restaurant on 35th - Lexington Avenue. I said yes. Please take us there. which I did

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I want what I thought it sent. The old bo. d me \$5.00. I was going to stick around there and see if she would beat it off them but a party jump in to the cab before I had finished with the old boss. If you can do something about this matter and need my help at anytime I will be glad to help, but please do not let my name get out. I am only working as a taxi driver 2 month and I don't want my friends to know I am working at such a ---- job.

If you cannot do anything about this I wish you would just drop me a postal card saying. I can't do anything about matter you wrote to me about. I will see if I can't do something about it.

Dear Sir:

Mr. James E. Bowden of the Legal Department, Hearst Corporations, 959 Eighth Avenue, New York City, appeared at the New York Office, at which time he indicated that he was desirous of obtaining certain information which might assist them in defending certain law suits initiated against Hearst Corporations by reason of articles recently appearing in local newspapers.

He stated that in one instance an article was placed in a Hearst publication by Dorothy Kilgallen to the effect that one SONYA YARB, formerly of local night clubs, is being held for questioning by the F.B.I. in Los Angeles. Further, it was stated that many of her boyfriends were enemy aliens.

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In addition, another law suit was being brought by reason of an article which was written by Walter Winchell wherein he made mention of the fact that a Viennese Count by the name of DE. WITT was well known to the F.B.I.

Mr. Bowden stated that he would appreciate it if we could make available to him certain information which would make it possible for them to definitely determine the veracity of these remarks, so that they might be in a position to defend the law suits.

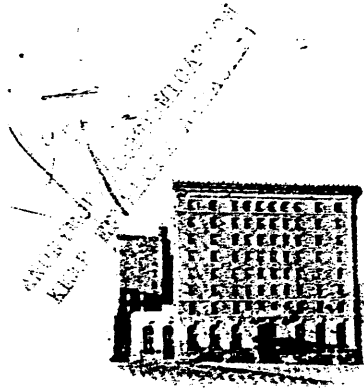
Special Agent [redacted] of this office, who was contacted by Mr. Bowden in this regard, advised him of the confidential nature of the information appearing in the files of this Bureau and suggested that any such request should properly be directed to the headquarters of the Bureau or the office of the Attorney General in Washington, D. C. This is being passed on to the Bureau in the event an inquiry should be received through Hearst Corporations for information concerning these matters.

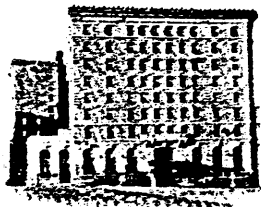

Dear Sir:

DOROTHY KILGALLAN in her daily newspaper column entitled "The Voice of Broadway" that appeared in the November 17, 1943 issue of the New York Journal American states the following:

"Doesn't that 'mysterious' package which Mrs. Litvinoff insists on carrying herself contain enough vitamin pills for thousands of Russian children?"

The Bureau was advised by New York teletype of November 10, 1943 that VASSILI M. ZUBILIN, a subject of instant investigation, E. D. KISSELEV, Consul General, New York City, and approximately twenty other people attended the farewell party held in honor of Mrs. LITVINOFF on her departure from New York City, Pennsylvania Station, at 2:30 P.M. November 10, 1943. It was also pointed out that Mrs. LITVINOFF would depart from the United States for Russia on or about November 15, 1943.

It would appear that Mrs. LITVINOFF probably replied to some inquiry that said package contained vitamin pills. The New York Office has no other information concerning the contents of the package referred to above.

YUGOSLAVIAN ACTIVITIES IN THE UNITED STATES
INTERNAL SECURITY - YU

In the syndicated column of Dorothy Kilgallen which appeared in the Pittsburgh Post-Gazette for March 22, 1945, the following appears under a caption, "All Around the Town":

"Wonder if the FBI knows that Marshal Tito, the Yugoslav leader, has agents in this country who beat and terrorize Yugoslavs who disagree with his policies. (It has happened here.)"

The above item was called to the attention of the Bureau by B. M. Pekich, Supreme Secretary of the Serb National Federation in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. He gave no information indicative of the fact that any such group of individuals does exist in the United States, nor does the column of Dorothy Kilgallen elucidate any further on this matter.

It is not desired that the New York Office at this time contact Dorothy Kilgallen. However, each Field Office receiving a copy of this communication is instructed to make appropriate inquiry amongst confidential informants in its territory who would be in a position to know of the existence of any such parties as described in the foregoing in the event they are operating in the United States.

Inquiry with respect to the above should be instituted immediately by the Field, with the results promptly made available to the Bureau by letter under this same caption.

Wonder if the FBI knows that Marshal Tito, the Yugoslav leader, has agents in this country who beat and terrorize Yugoslavs who disagree with his policies. (It has happened here.)

We are interested whether the F.B.I. knows that in this country exists a terroristic organization which prosecutes those people from Yugoslavia who are not in sympathy with communist dictator and terrorist, so-called "Marshal" Tito in Yugoslavia.

Tito and his communist gangsters are killing and prosecuting all those who are against his communistic dictatorship. Already thousands of people have been killed by his gang and thousands placed in concentration camps all over Yugoslavia. Even some were sent to Russia.

As Americans of Serbian descent, we are interested in our relatives in Yugoslavia where Serbian people are left at mercy under Titos gangsters. The Serbian people in Yugoslavia were the only ones in Europe who dared to revolt against Hitlerism and the only people who fought for years under the galant leadership of Draza Mihailovich.

Mr. Hoover:

You will recall that on February 23rd I brought to your attention information concerning an incident where [redacted] and [redacted] were involved in a case of mayhem on a young man named [redacted] and that Mayor LaGuardia had ordered District Attorney Frank Hogan to immediately investigate the case.

[redacted] and [redacted] have both been questioned. Up to the present time [redacted] has remained outside of the jurisdiction of the District Attorney's Office and has not been questioned. It is understood he has been at Atlantic City. It has been confidentially determined that Donohue will be brought to the District Attorney's office tomorrow morning by his attorney.



It has been learned that the District Attorney's office has been unable to develop a case in this matter and no prosecutive action is contemplated. District Attorney Hogan has said that he wished the entire matter had never arisen because his office is being placed in the embarrassing position of having two young men of wealth involved in a situation where if no prosecutive action is taken it might appear as if his office had been influenced by their social connections.

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. TOLSON
MR. NICHOLS

On November 20th Mr. [redacted] of New York called me to bring to my attention an item which had appeared that day in Dorothy Kilgallen's column to the effect that I was to personally appear in some Hollywood movie. He stated he wanted to suggest to me that I by no means do this. I told [redacted] that I had not heard of this item and that there was certainly absolutely no truth to this. I stated that I had no intention of appearing in any movie and that I did not know what Miss Kilgallen's item was predicated upon. *Street with NO NAME*

When I later ascertained that it obviously was predicated on an item appearing in Variety which apparently had been inspired by either Twentieth Century Fox or some source close to it incident to the new picture which that movie is proposing to make on the work of this Bureau, I indicated to Mr. Tolson that I wanted word to be sent to Twentieth Century Fox that such publicity must not be issued. I am absolutely determined against personally appearing in any picture. I understand, of course, that the Twentieth Century Fox people have indicated that they did not inspire this item, but the fact remains that in the script submitted there is a provision for me to appear in the picture at the end of it. I, of course, do not intend to do so.

While we are committed to cooperate with this studio in the making of the forthcoming picture on the Bureau, that commitment does not include the appearance in the picture of either myself or any other key Bureau official. I want, of course, the fullest assistance to be rendered to the studio in the making of this picture, but that assistance must be limited to advice and suggestions and not the utilization of key Bureau personnel in the picture. I have no objection, of course, to a number of the Bureau experts such as firearms and laboratory workers appearing but in those instances I do not want their identities to be publicized or cashed in on by the studio.

We might as well have this understanding at the beginning so that we will not have any arguments or extended controversies later on with the studio representatives. I intend that the picture,

Columnist Dorothy Kilgallen stated in her column in the New York Journal American, May 11, 1950, "Big break in Reuther shooting on the way". SAC O'Connor advised there are no significant developments indicating any break in this case and he recommended against interviewing Kilgallen.

SAC O'Connor stated that they had been in touch with the Detroit Police Department and the Michigan State Police in connection with this case and they have furnished no information indicating any early break or solution to the Reuther shootings. He stated Kilgallen is in no position to receive information which would not be received by us and he feels that her statement in her column is merely an attempt to draw us out for further information. He stated that due to her unreliability he recommended against interviewing her.

It will be recalled that once previously Kilgallen commented on this case and we did not interview her because of her unreliability.
